XWARN Mission

Mesh at the Twin Cities Marathon

It's been a while since I've posted anything from the ARES e-Letter only because I haven't been around the ARRL website much lately. But I went there today and noticed an <u>article</u> (http://bit.ly/2RINALH) about how some amateur radio operators support public service events in other areas.

In this case, they were supporting the Twin Cities Marathon. Their primary role is supporting non-emergency a volunteer medical support services as well as providing a family "reunification" service that tracks runners receiving medical services or otherwise have been seen to leave the race course for whatever reason. Remember that almost any event of any size will track participants who stay on the course by RFID tag on their number.

Of particular note are some of the technologies they use to provide services.

Radios include rented UHF trunked radios, five amateur radio repeaters, mesh networking using 5GHz Ubiquiti equipment, and various other systems including D-STAR. The article did not state why the UHF trunked radios were being used, but one explanation is something I've talked about in the past — if you are trying to integrate other volunteers into your communications plan, you need something other than amateur radio whether it's a Part 90 radio or MURS, FRS, or GMRS under Part 95.

They also wrote not only a web-based application to track all of the collected information but also implemented a chat application to pass along certain types of information. If you've ever taken the emergency communications course offered by ARRL, they make it very clear that certain modes are better for passing certain kinds of information, e.g. the amateur radio operator who was trying to "morse" out a page-long list of names when there was a perfectly good fax machine with a perfectly good phone line on the other side of the room. D'oh!

Finally, there are several paragraphs on their mesh setup. I'll let you visit the ARRL e-Letter online for the details, but as a teaser I'll just say they needed to send video 10 miles at 5GHz! For those of you who don't know, that is a difficult task.
